




Exurbs: Texas-Sized Growth

- Outside of large metropolitan areas like Dallas-Fort Worth, Houston, Austin, and San Antonio
- White collar, middle-income, home-owning families who commute into metro city center for work
- Texas has largest exurbanite population in the United States relative to its size



<u>Findings</u>


Exurb growth is having a substantial impact on Texas's state and local infrastructure, including the following three policy areas:



Education:

Facilities Cannot Keep Up With Exurb Growth

- Rapid, above-average increase in K-12 enrollment across exurb districts
- Building of new facilities takes ~1 year, cannot match growth rate
- Additional funding from the state for fast-growth districts is insufficient and often inflexible

■ 2011-2012 ■ 2015-2016 ■ 2020-2021



Transportation:

Exurb Growth Raises Fatal Car Accident Risk

- Large percentage of exurbanites commuting into nearby metro center for work
- Rural roads more dangerous for drivers, fatal car crashes on the rise in Texas

Percent of Total Exurb County Workforce Commuting into City Center





<u>Irresponsible Development Increases Risk of Flooding</u>


- Significant wetland loss due to development
- Funding & personnel issues hinder pre-assessments of development impacts & informed permits
- Many local flood infrastructure projects on hold due to lack of supplemental funds
