# MIA-MPH Application Checklist – Fall 2025



# Priority MIA Funding Application Deadline: December 15, 2024 Final Application Deadline: February 1, 2025

The Bush School's Graduate Admissions Office works in conjunction with the School of Public Health to process applications for the Master of International Affairs—Master of Public Health combined degree program. Applicants begin the application process by submitting a SOPHAS application through the School of Public Health, then submitting an MIA Supplemental Application through the Bush School. Use the checklist below to mark off items as you upload/submit. We recommend you make copies of your materials (except pieces in sealed envelopes) for your own records. #### Fall 2025 Application Deadlines:

MIA Priority Funding Deadline: December 15, 2024
Application Deadline: February 1, 2025

Applications completed by the priority funding deadline are considered for nomination-based funding awards. Applications completed after December 15, but prior to the application deadline, will still receive a competitive, merit-based scholarship. However, nomination-based opportunities may no longer be available.

#### **APPLICATION PROCESS & OVERVIEW**

The Bush School Admissions Office works in conjunction with the School of Public Health – Office of Graduate Student Services to process applications for the Master of International Affairs–Master of Public Health (MIA-MPH) combined degree program.

Applicants apply to the program by submitting a SOPHAS application through the School of Public Health first. Upon submission of the SOPHAS application, the applicant then submits a Supplemental MIA Application. Both applications, all supporting documents, test scores (if applicable), and recommendation letters must be received by the application deadlines listed above. Applications submitted but missing any of the following items are considered incomplete and will NOT be considered for admission.

★ Note: The Bush School will notify applicants via email of any missing items required to complete the MIA portion of the application process and/or when their application is complete, so be sure to monitor the email address you entered on your application.

Applicants are emailed in late January/early February if their application is denied, placed on hold pending further review, or invited to interview for the MIA portion of the program. Applicants invited to interview are encouraged to attend Interview Conference Weekend (February 21 & 22, 2025), but alternative interviews are scheduled via Zoom for those unable to attend.

In early March, once all interviews are completed, the MIA Admissions and Scholarship Committees meet to make final admissions and scholarship decisions for the MIA portion of the program. The Bush School Admissions Office then works with the School of Public Health to notify applicants by mid-to-late March of their final admissions decisions for each portion of program and the scholarship awarded for the MIA portion. Applicants have until April 15 to accept or decline their offer of admission.

# **SOPHAS APPLICATION**

First, submit a SOPHAS application to the School of Public Health. A non-refundable application fee is required. Visit the School of Public Health Admissions website for instructions.

Submitting the SOPHAs application is only one step in the application process. Please submit the SOPHAS application well in advance of the February 1<sup>st</sup> deadline to ensure your application is not missing any required items and to give yourself time to then submit the Supplemental MIA Application by the application deadlines listed above.

# **SUPPLEMENTAL MIA APPLICATION**

After submitting the SOPHAS application to the School of Public Health, fill out and submit the **Supplemental MIA**Application to the Bush School by the application deadlines listed above.

The Supplemental MIA Application will ask you to answer several MIA program-specific questions and if needed, a personal statement that addresses the MIA prompt, an MIA focused resume if different than the resume you uploaded to your application in SOPHAS, and GRE/GMAT test scores (if desired).

# **RÉSUMÉ**

Upload a current résumé to the SOPHAS application.

If you would like to submit an MIA focused résumé that highlights your international experiences, language, and focus, we encourage you to upload it to the <u>Supplemental MIA Application</u>. An MIA <u>Résumé Template</u> is available which includes the following sections:

- Name and Contact Information
- Education
- Work/Internship/Military Experiences
- International Experience
- Skills and Certifications (language, software, clearance, etc.)
- Leadership, Service, Organizations, and Honors

# **PERSONAL STATEMENT**

Upload your personal statement to the SOPHAS application. However, if that statement does not address items in the MIA prompt below, please upload a statement that does to the Supplemental MIA Application.

Statements should be typed in 11 pt font, spaced 1.5", and address the following prompt. Include your name, the title "Personal Statement", and page number on each page.

**Prompt**: In 1,000 words or less, please address the following topics in your personal statement:

- What inspired or influenced you to pursue a career in international affairs (include relevant people, places, travel, courses, internships, and/or events),
- Your personal and professional goals within international affairs,
- What value you bring to the program (include meaningful experiences, education, and/or jobs you have had), and
- How an education from the Bush School will help you to achieve your goals.

# **RECOMMENDATIONS (3)**

Three recommendations (each consisting of a letter and brief evaluation) are required and must be received by the application deadline. Recommendations are requested and submitted through the applicant's SOPHAS application. The Bush School and the School of Public Health will use the same recommendations.

At least one recommendation must be an academic reference from a higher education institution and another from a professional reference. Preferably, the academic reference should come from one of the applicant's course instructors who can attest to the applicant's capability to pursue graduate studies. The remaining letter may be professional or academic. Recommendation letters from family and friends are not appropriate.

#### TRANSCRIPTS and/or WES ICAP COURSE-BY-COURSE EVALUATION

The following is required depending on where the college(s) you attended is located. Required for all colleges attended, regardless of if coursework that was transferred from one college to another.

For U.S. and English-speaking Canadian colleges: Order official transcripts through the SOPHAS application → Academic History quadrant → Colleges Attended section. Add the college(s) you attended. Then, press the 'Order' link for each college.

For all other colleges located outside of the U.S. and non-English speaking Canadian colleges: Request a World Education Services (WES) course-by-course (ICAP) evaluation and U.S. equivalency determination through the SOPHAS application → Academic History quadrant → Colleges Attended section. Add the college(s) you attended. Then, press the 'Order' link for each college.

# **GRE/GMAT TEST SCORES (optional)**

GRE or GMAT test scores are NOT required for either program. For the MIA, scores are:

- **Strongly encouraged** for those with a cumulative GPA below a 3.2.
- Encouraged and accepted for those who feel their scores can complement a strong file or offset potential
  concerns such as a low GPA, lack of experience in the field, or if grades/experience do not reflect current
  abilities. When deciding if scores will help or hinder, consider the MIA average GRE score of 308.

Applicants weighing the decision to submit scores should consider their testing ability, time to study, and whether scores will help or hinder their application (our average GRE score is a 308). We prefer the GRE test over GMAT. Scores must be within five years of the date the application is submitted.

\*\*OFFICIAL GRE/GMAT SCORES ARE ONLY NEEDED FOR INTERNATIONAL APPLICANTS who wish to provide Proof of English Proficiency via their GRE/GMAT Verbal score. See instructions below for submitting official scores.\*\*

# **PROOF OF ENGLISH PROFICIENCY** (for citizens from non-English speaking countries)

Official English language proficiency (ELP) test scores are required for most international applicants. Citizens of certain English-speaking countries are exempt from this requirement. Refer to the list on the <u>TAMU International Graduate Admissions website</u>. If your country is not on the exempted list of countries, you must provide proof of English proficiency. We have included the <u>School of Public Health ELP requirements</u> as shown on their website.

Acceptable Methods for Proof of English Proficiency:

- GRE Verbal Score of at least 153 (or 22 on GMAT verbal) from a test date within five years of applying.
  - Send to SOPHAS using GRE code 7841.
- **❖ TOEFL iBT Score of at least 95** from a test date within two years of applying; the Bush School prefers a 100 i-BT. MyBest TOEFL Scores not accepted
  - Send to SOPHAS using school code 5688.
- **TOEFL Essentials Overall Band Score of at least 10** from a test date within two years of applying.
  - Send to Texas A&M University using school code 6003.
- ❖ IELTS Overall Band Score of at least 7.0 from a test date within two years of applying.
  - Submit via electronic score delivery service to: Texas A&M University (College Station or Galveston).
- Alternative Verification: Complete all four years of a bachelor's degree (equivalent to four years) or higher (masters is typically two years) at an accredited university in the US.

Applicants are advised to complete tests at least two months before the application deadline. Test scores can take anywhere from two to six weeks to be processed, depending on the test. Applications missing the required proof of English proficiency will not be reviewed or considered for admission.
